Attempts to Appease Zealots Who Stoned Staff Buses

JERUSALEM (Israeli Sector), July 17—Hadassah, the women's Zionist service organization, will attempt to transport essential members of its hospital staff here by "ambulance" next week-end to avoid a recurrence of stonings of buses by religious zealots.

Violent demonstrations were

staged yesterday and the day before, mainly by an ultraOrthodox sect called Natorei Karta, or Guardians of the City, after an early shift of physicians and nurses started out Saturday morning by special bus for Hadassah's new medical center in Ein Karem. It lies in the Judean hills outside Jerusalem.

Meeting Devises Plan

the Jerusalem Religious Council, the rabbinate and Dr. Kalman J. Mann, director of the Hadassah Medical Center. Dr. Mann said he would transport the 400 persons he needed to furnish minimum services at the medical center in "ambulances" in which no fares would be collected and

Dr. Mann also promised to provide facilities at the medical center for an overnight stay for those of his staff who desire it, so they would not have to break Sabbath injunctions against travel. The Jewish Sabbath
